

Chapter 1 : Sally Jessy Raphael - Episodes - IMDb

Sally Lowenthal (born February 25,), better known as Sally Jessy Raphael, is an American former talk show host known for her talk show program Sally (originally titled The Sally Jessy Raphael Show), which she hosted for two decades, and for the bright red oversized eyeglasses she wears in all public appearances.

What was it like talking to her? Well, my mother is different now. She is, like, real fragmented. She told me, later, from my sister, Emma, found out what exactly she was talking about. How did you know about the lingo, Emma? Well, I was involved in the organization 13 years ago, I was on staff. For a long time or a short time? I spent seven months with them. So I thought, "Great, a golden opportunity. And so, I had left. Now, what got mother involved in Scientology in the first place? I think what got my mom involved was, she had eight children. She devoted her life to us. When the littlest one left home, I think she had a little bit of empty nest syndrome. She had a poor marriage. And I think she wanted to work on her marriage and she also wanted to do something with her life. My mother is a very loving, very Christian, gentle kind of person, and she thought that she was going to help save the world. I know you two are desperate. I talked to you just before the show, and you are absolutely desperate. Mother seems to have found a life. And this cult is a for-profit business, and I want everybody to understand that; they are making big money. They are not paying my mother. Is that true what we saw on the tape? For how many days work? Six days a week? Well, of course, they study on their own time. They control her every moment. She has to get permission from them. She has to call them in on her day off. She has to call in and get instructions. She had to call them and get instructions how to handle me, because I was questioning them. And because I question her and what is going to happen to her, she is going to have to impose punishment upon herself, because I have asked her to take a vacation. She told me that she would be considered a "PTS," potential trouble source, because she is supposed to have me under control. She evidently committed a crime a couple years ago. So she washed dishes for 14 hours. Now, the last time you tried to get through to mother -- and we have eight brothers and sisters here who are desperate to get their mother back, out of Scientology -- you were sent a book called *Can We Ever Be Friends?* It came with a tape or something. That was what she was told would get Emma and I back in line. And what does this book say? Well, this book -- I took it to be just propaganda from them. Well, why is asking to spend a vacation with my mother an enemy type of action? I mean, why is that wrong? Why should a year-old woman not have a week off to see her children? I really think that the family should be connected. I mean, what is retirement? What about health insurance? And, before that, he was too young to remember her. You said she appeared to be deprived of sleep, not able to think clearly. My old mother was bubbly, happy-go-lucky. She loved to travel. She loved to cross-stitch. She just loved life and she loved people. She loved being with people and my new mother -- You have to feed the conversation. The bubble is all gone. Besides taping that and bringing it to us, what are the eight kids going to do to rescue mother? Well, I think what needs to be done -- This cult is a business for profit. And if they paid their taxes and if they paid their employees, or their workers, whatever you want to call them, their volunteers, like any other business in America has to pay their taxes and their employees, they would be brought to their knees. So I think that everybody needs to start doing a little bit of talking, and a little bit of networking. Oh, so that might give you mother back. So, if anyone attacks you, you attack the attacker. We have been told that there are certain people in Scientology that want us out of their way. Want the two of

you out of their way? Yes, yes, that came back through our mother, through another sister. I mean, what do you think the world will see when they see that? Next, a woman dying of cancer who says the Church of Scientology is to blame. Val and Emma, what is Scientology? Can you just say what it is? Do you want to try? And then what they do is they draw them in, take their money, take their time. So it could be a religion and it could be a philosophy? All right, a combination. Roxanne grew up, like most girls, with lots of dreams for her future. I think you were going to be an opera star, were you not? But when Roxanne turned 18, the dreams were shattered when she joined the Church of Scientology. Roxanne says it was this Church that destroyed her life. And recently, she has been diagnosed with terminal cancer. Now, she feels that Scientology contributed greatly to her illness and may be even to blame for it. You were in the Church when you got sick. Yes, OK, I was involved for 13 years. You are a very rich person. I had my own business and I worked night and day. I did some work for the Church of Scientology, as well. I worked night and day, often weeks on end without sleep, and I did make some money.

Despite being panned for their lowbrow nature and appealing to the lowest common denominator, tabloid talk shows have struck a chord with television audiences and have been popular for the past 50 years. In 1949, he started one of the first radio talk shows, and in 1955 he tried his hand at television with *The Phil Donahue Show* later shortened to *Donahue*. Audience members were able to ask questions or talk with guests and Donahue was more of a moderator than traditional talk show host. In 1962, the show went into national syndication and became hugely popular, forever changing the landscape of talk shows. The show had rather taboo topics for the time; for example, the first guest on the show was an atheist. Donahue managed to stay on the air for almost 30 years, before getting cancelled in 1992. Donahue went into retirement until July 1994, when MSNBC resurrected *Donahue*, but it was cancelled after eight months due to poor ratings.

Sally Jessy Raphael After getting her degree in broadcasting from Columbia, Raphael whose real name is Sally Lowenthal, went to work in Puerto Rico as a correspondent. After that, she came back to the United States to work in broadcasting. In 1968, she finally landed steady work as both a morning anchor and an afternoon radio newscaster in Miami. In 1970, she moved to New York, where her popularity started to grow with audiences nationwide with her radio call-in show. He gave Raphael a chance with her own half hour talk show located in St. The *Sally Jessy Raphael Show* went on the air on October 17, 1970, and within six months, the show became nationally syndicated. Raphael, whose trademark red framed glasses became instantly recognizable, was known for taking a liberal stance on many topics like homosexuality, abortion, and premarital sex. This, of course, did not sit well with conservatives during the Reagan era. In the end, Raphael stayed on the air until 1992, when her show was cancelled. They started doing paternity tests, confronted bullies, and revealed secret crushes. Schmitz went on the show knowing he had a secret admirer, but was led to believe that it was a woman. That night, Amedure, Schmitz, and a mutual friend drank together. The friend claimed that after the taping, Amedure and Schmitz had a sexual encounter, but Schmitz denies that. Three days later, they were back home and Schmitz found a sexually suggestive letter from Amedure. In a call, Schmitz blamed the show for the murder. After the murder, the episode was never aired. He was given years in *Maury Povich*

After graduating from the University of Pennsylvania with a degree in television journalism, Maury Povich started working as a reporter and newscaster in Washington, DC. In 1968, he became the host of a new tabloid news show, *A Current Affair*. During that time, the climate of tabloid television was changing drastically and shows were given the choice: Other shows often feature lie detector tests, makeovers, possessive men, and wild teens. Since changing the format, Maury has been a staple of the daytime talk show circuit and Povich is a pop culture icon, known for his famous expression when announcing the results of the paternity test. The show was renewed in 1992 for four more years. The game show involved a bachelor or bachelorette, who would ask three eligible single people behind a wall a series of question. The contestant would then pick one of them, and they would go on some elaborate date together. The show aired on December 20, 1992, on ABC and it was an instant hit. The next year, Barris made a show to pair with *The Dating Game* called *The Newlywed Game*, where newly married couples were asked questions to see how much they knew about each other. It was also a big hit. But the show that Barris struck trash gold with was *The Gong Show* in 1982. The premise of the show was that people performed an act for three celebrity judges. If the performance got to be unwatchable, a judge could bang a large gong to put an end to the act. One very notable controversy happened in 1982 when two year-old girls came out, sat crossed legged on the floor and very suggestively ate a popsicle. No one rang the gong, but two out of the three judges gave them low marks. Singer and actress Jaye P. Morgan gave them 10 out of 10, saying that was how she got started as well. Many people went on the show and completely made fools of themselves in front of a national audience. Barris also published an autobiography called *Confessions of a Dangerous Mind*, in which he claimed that the entire time he was a television producer, he was also a CIA hitman. The book was adapted into a film in 1999, directed by George Clooney and starring Sam Rockwell as Barris. He would only stay there for two years before he was

fired over a disagreement about a story. In 1968, Rivera got his own talk show, *Geraldo*, and it quickly gained notoriety for its controversial topics and guests. When asked about the incident, Geraldo said that if there was ever a time for violence, that was it. The brawl made national headlines and also gave the ratings a huge boost, because news of the brawl was made public before the episode aired. This brawl would of course lay the foundation for another, very controversial show just years later. *Geraldo* was cancelled in 1971 and he is currently a contributor to Fox News. Crane also interviewed Randy Wicker, the first openly gay male on television. Crane, who was just 30 at the time, never really found an audience and was cancelled just a few months later. After losing to Carson, Crane tried another talk show which also failed, and had some small acting parts. In 1971, he became the chairman of a successful computer software company called Software Toolworks, and passed away at the age of 74 in July 1992. In 1968, he got his start in television and by 1971, his television show was syndicated in 84 cities. On top of that, his hour long radio show was syndicated in 100 cities. On his show, Pyne would chain smoke behind a news desk, not unlike Edward R. Murrow, but instead of asking questions, Pyne would actively look for confrontation and often found it. Pyne was one of the first people on TV to argue from his own viewpoint instead of being unbiased, which led to him openly insulting his guests while being cheered on by his studio audience. As for his guests, he would find the most extreme and outrageous people of the day, like the head of the Church of Satan or a man who had been married 17 times. He died at the age of 45 on March 23, 1992. That man was year-old Morton Downey Jr.: The show was popular locally and went national a year later. The Morton Downey Jr. Show became a huge hit, mainly because Downey was loud, belligerent, and unapologetic. Downey justified his show saying that yelling and confrontation was how a lot of Americans were raised. One notable guest that Downey had on many times was Al Sharpton, who made a name for himself on the show. An interesting story involving Downey and Sharpton was the case of Tawana Brawley. She was a black teenager, who was found wrapped in a plastic bag on the roadside in New York State in November 1987. Someone had written racial epitaphs on her body and she was covered in feces. She claimed she had been raped by a group of white officers. Her story made national headlines when Sharpton took up her cause. Downey confronted Sharpton over the validity of the story, and it turned out Brawley had set the whole thing up. This story would prove to be important in the downfall of Downey, which started in 1988. It was hard booking guests for the show, because no one wanted to go on a show where they would be yelled at and insulted by Morton while he was being cheered on. It was great for the audience; not so much for the guests. A short time later, in San Francisco, Downey was found in a bathroom stall in an airport with a bruise on his face, his hair cut, and swastikas drawn on him with felt markers. Downey claimed that a group of skinheads attacked him. He even passed a polygraph, but all evidence indicated that Downey faked the attack. His show was cancelled shortly afterwards and a year later, he filed for bankruptcy. He passed away in 1995 at the age of 57. The man is synonymous with trash television, and he seemingly embraces being king of rock bottom. Born on February 13, 1938, to parents who escaped the Holocaust, Springer came to the United States when he was five-years-old. Working with Kennedy encouraged Springer to get into politics. He ran for Congress in Ohio, but lost. In 1974, he won a seat on the Cincinnati city council, where he served for five terms. He even survived a sex scandal in 1978 when it was discovered that he had been with a prostitute he paid with a personal check. After losing the election for governor of Ohio in 1982, he was approached by a number of television stations to do a talk show. In 1983, *The Jerry Springer Show* debuted and, at first, it covered political topics. Then in 1985, in order to boost ratings, a new producer from the tabloid *The Weekly World News* was brought in to adjust the show. The show was a hit and a cultural phenomenon for being so outrageous. The show was so popular, it even led to a horrible movie and an opera. In 1990, the show was forced to stop showing violence. It was during this time that violence on TV was a hot button issue in the wake of the Columbine shooting. Yet, the show remained popular and is still on the air. It is scheduled to be on the air until at least 2010.

Sally has a younger brother, Steven Lowenthal. The station had a program by and for junior high school students and Raphael read the news. She also got considerable experience in the media in Puerto Rico, where she worked in both radio and television—one of her jobs was doing a TV cooking show. It was while working in radio that she met the man who became her second husband, Karl Soderlund, who was the general manager of a radio station that hired her. After he was fired, the two left Puerto Rico to work in Miami, Florida. It was while Raphael was on the air as a radio announcer in Miami that she met and became friends with talk show host Larry King. She told numerous reporters over the years that she bounced around from station to station in both Puerto Rico and the United States, working as a disc jockey, news reporter, and the host of a show where she interviewed celebrities. She refused to give up, even though at one point, she had worked at 24 stations, and was fired from 18 of them. In the early s, she would finally get the right opportunity when she was asked to do a call-in advice show on radio. In the late s, she guest starred as herself in The Equalizer episode "Making of a Martyr". She hosted a radio call-in advice show distributed by NBC Talknet which ran from Monday November 2, to , but is most famous for hosting the television talk show, The Sally Jessy Raphael Show later shortened to simply Sally , which ran in first-run syndication from October 17, to May 24, Before going on the air, she decided that rather than doing a political show, she would give advice and discuss subjects she knew a lot about, such as relationship problems. Soon, her advice show was being heard on over radio stations, and she developed a loyal group of fans. His encouragement led to a tryout on television, where producer Burt Dubrow gave her a chance to be a guest host on a talk show of his. She was not very polished, but people who had loved her radio show were very positive about her being on TV. Her non-threatening and common-sense manner appealed to Dubrow, who believed she would gain more confidence as she got some TV experience. In , she began having trouble seeing the Teleprompter clearly, and she went to buy some reading glasses at a nearby store. All they had was a pair with red frames, and being in a hurry, she bought them. While her bosses disliked them, the audience seemed to think they looked good, so she kept wearing that style from then on. During the s, as competition in the talk show arena intensified, her show moved toward more sensationalistic topics, as did many of the other talk show hosts who were her competition, including Jerry Springer who, at the time, was also distributed by Multimedia Entertainment and Maury Povich. Raphael was already having problems with her syndicator: She celebrated her 3,th episode in early By March , it was announced that after an year run, her show was being canceled. She was one of only three personalities to make both the radio and the TV lists. The name "Talknet" is a revival of the name of NBC Talknet , the now defunct radio network that carried her previous radio show from to She abruptly ended the show July 7, Personal life[edit] Sally Jessy Raphael was married for the first time in , at age 18, to Andrew Vladimir, with whom she had two daughters: They divorced 5 years later.
