## Chapter 1 : Md. Medal of Honor Recipient Steals Show at DNC Â« CBS Baltimore

Black Hollow, on the Ferney Mountain Railroad, was the scene last night of a terrible accident by which two men were killed outright and four others were badly injured. Ferney is twelve miles west of Lock Haven. Last night, at about 5: The truck on which they proposed to ride four and a half miles down the mountain, had been taken out to the woods with a locomotive. The men had gone some distance toward the boarding house when they came to a place where the grade was greater and they noticed that their descent was becoming more rapid. Israel Boyer, the foreman, was at the brakes, which he applied with such strength as to stop the wheels from revolving. The rails were wet with the drizzling rain which was falling and the brakes had no effect towards checking the speed of the truck. Another steep decline was reached and the truck was flying at lightning speed. Yocum and Spade escaped with but slight injuries. From the time the four men jumped off until the truck collided with the locomotive at Black Hollow, was but an instant. When the collision came the truck was smashed into a thousand pieces, and the men were sent flying through space until they came in contact with something stationary. Thomas White, the engineer, was on his engine and Charles Streck, fireman, was standing on the ground near the engine. Williams, of Pine Station, was standing on an embankment above the railroad track only a short distance from the engine. The shades of night were falling and in the deep hollows along Ferney run it was already growing dark. The scene was one which men who witnessed the accident will never forget. The cries of the injured caused the men to devote their attention first to them. As quickly as possible a messenger was dispatched to Farrandsville, five miles distant, from where a telegram was sent to Lock Haven, asking that physicians be sent at once to care for the injured. The dead and injured were tenderly lifted and placed upon an empty truck and taken to the boarding house, a mile distant, where all was done to alleviate the sufferings of the injured until the arrival of the physicians. Injured - Oscar Grugan, lives on opposite side of the river from Ferney, skull fractured and physicians say he cannot recover. William Ramatine, concussion of the brain. Israel Boyer, Lock Haven, left foot crushed, scalp wound and back injured. Physicians amputated two of his toes. Horace Freed, of Beavertown, right leg fractured above and below the knee, knee cap torn loose. Boyer and Freed were both suffering great pain today. Freed was taken to the hospital at Williamsport, and Boyer was removed to his home in this city today. They were brought down on Day Express train. The body of Eisinger was sent on direct to Beavertown, and that of Davis was taken to the home of Israel Boyer, on Henderson street, this city. The boarding house to which the injured men were taken is only a short distance from the Philadelphia and Erie railroad, and there the physicians found the suffering woodsmen. Their wounds were dressed and the sufferers made as comfortable as medical skill could do, and the doctors returned to this city again on the midnight train. A messenger also arrived by that train to notify Coroner Mader that his services needed, and undertaker Bricker was also informed that he was expected to furnish coffins for the dead and prepare the bodies for burial. At Black Hollow, there is a switch, and trucks are run in on a siding to be loaded with prop timber. When Thomas White, the engineer, left the men at the terminus of the road at 5: He had just finished filling the tank with water, when he heard the men who were coming on the truck hallowing. He reached his hand up to grasp the rope, which, when pulled, would set the whistle to sounding, but before he could do so the collision occurred. Williams, who stood on the embankment above the track, and saw the collision, says the truck came like a flash of lightning. The engineer had the brakes set on his engine but the force of the collision sent the heavy locomotive back the length of itself. David Spade and Ad Yocum, the men who escaped with but slight injuries, jumped from the truck at the top of the first hill. Oscar Grugan was the next man to jump and he was found lying among the rocks where he had fallen. William Ramstine followed Grugan when he jumped, and it is thought his head struck a stump. The

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Coroner empaneled as jurors B. Waite and Joe M. The bodies of the dead men lay in one of the rooms of a building used as a place for sleeping by the woodsmen. A number of witnesses were before the jurors, after which the investigation was adjourned until this evening when the jurors will reassemble at the office of Coroner Mader and hear further testimony. All of the men who were on the truck when it came flying down the mountainside were unmarried with the exception of Israel Boyer and John Davis. The latter leaves a wife, but no children. Davis is staying at the home of Israel Boyer on Henderson street, this city, and is almost frantic with grief. Oscar Grugan, the young man whose skull is fractured and whose death is likely to result to day from his injuries, is about 23 years of age and a son of John S. The young man is a nephew of County Commissioner John Grugan. Israel Boyer, one of the men injured, is a son of the superintendent, and John Davis, who was killed, is his brother-in-law. Superintendent Boyer was unremitting in his attentions to the injured men and did all that could possibly be done to ease their sufferings and make them comfortable. There are only four houses at Ferney, and the nearest telegraph station is five miles distant. The news of the terrible accident was quickly spread throughout the city last night and the list of the dead and injured greatly exaggerated. Editor Dillon, of the Renovo News, was on the train going from this city to Renovo last night and stopped off at Ferney. He and a representative of the Express were the only newspaper men at the scene of the disaster. He stated this morning that after the car reached the bottom of what is called "the hill" it seemed to fairly fly through space. The speed was frightful, and he thinks it was over one hundred miles an hour. His only thought was of the safety of the men who were with him, and he had but little time to think of his own danger. Engineer White also said the speed was frightful to think of, and the rate at which the truck shot down the mountain was difficult to comprehend. The remains of John Davis will be taken to Tamaqua for burial. The deceased was aged about 30 years. Eisinger, whose remains were forwarded to Beavertown today was aged 52 years. Grant Beaver, one to the men employed by Mr. Boyer, accompanied the body. Oscar died of complications several months later, eight days after his father died. Oscar died on the day he was to be married. Oscar died of complications from injuries received in a railway accident.

Background[ edit ] The KKK and a "Fiery Cross"; image from the s In the early s Mississippi, as well as most of the South, defied federal direction regarding racial integration. Bombings, murders, vandalism, and intimidation were tactics used by white supremacists in order to discourage black Mississippians and their Northern supporters. In Freedom Riders , who challenged the segregation of interstate buses and related facilities, were attacked on their route. In September , the University of Mississippi riots had occurred in order to prevent James Meredith from enrolling at the school. As the summer of approached, white Mississippians prepared for what they perceived was an invasion from the north. College students had been recruited in order to aid local activists who were conducting grassroots community organizing, voter registration education and drives in the state. Media reports exaggerated the number of youths expected. This status quo had long been enforced by economic boycotts and violence. Freedom schools were established in order to educate, encourage, and register the disenfranchised black citizens. The White Knights wanted to lure CORE workers to Neshoba County, so they attacked congregation members and torched the church, burning it to the ground. They decided to head west on Highway 16 to Philadelphia, the seat of Neshoba County, then take southbound Highway 19 to Meridian, figuring it would be the faster route. The time was approaching three in the afternoon, and they were to be in Meridian by four. The CORE station wagon had barely passed the Philadelphia city limits when one of its tires went flat, and Deputy Sheriff Cecil Ray Price turned on his dashboard-mounted red light and followed them. They were taken to the Neshoba County jail on Myrtle Street, a block from the courthouse. In the Meridian office, workers became alarmed when the 4 p. Rainey , Bernard L. Akin, Other "Otha" N. Burrage , Edgar Ray Killen. Warner, Herman Tucker and Samuel H. Rainey , were later identified as parties to the conspiracy to murder the three workers. He has been accused of murdering several other black people[ when? At the time of the murders, the year-old Rainey insisted he was visiting his sick wife in a Meridian hospital and was later with family watching Bonanza. Known for his tobacco chewing habit, Rainey was photographed and quoted in Life magazine: Burkes, who usually went by the nickname of Otha, was a Philadelphia Police officer. The year-old World War I veteran was a year veteran on the city police force; he was reported to have a cruel disposition, especially toward black people. Burrage, who was 34 at the time, owned a trucking company. Burrage, an honorably discharged U. Marine , is quoted as saying: Harris, also known as Pete, was a White Knight investigator. Warner, known as Pops, was a Meridian grocery owner. Warner, 54, was a member of the White Knights. Tucker, 36, was not a member of the White Knights, but he was a building contractor who worked for Burrage. Bowers , who served with the U. Navy during World War II, was not apprehended on December 4, , but he was implicated the following year. Bowers, then 39, is credited with saying: And in a war, there have to be some who suffer. It must be an extremely swift, extremely violent, hit-and-run group. Price , Travis M. Roberts , Jimmy K. Although federal authorities believed there were many others who took part in the Neshoba County lynching, only ten men were charged with the physical murders of Chaney, Goodman, and Schwerner. Before his friend Lawrence A. Rainey was elected sheriff in , Cecil R. Price worked as a salesman, bouncer, and fireman. The year-old Price was the only person who witnessed the entire event. He arrested the three men, released them the night of the murders, and chased them down state highway 19 toward Meridian, eventually re-capturing them at the intersection near House, Mississippi. Price and the other nine men escorted them north along highway 19 to Rock Cut Road, where they forced a stop and murdered the three civil rights workers. Killen went to Meridian earlier that Sunday to organize and recruit men for the job to be carried out in Neshoba County. Barnette, 36, went to his Meridian home to take care of a sick family member. Barnette owned a Meridian garage and was a

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member of the White Knights. Roberts, 26, was a dishonorably discharged U. Marine who worked as a salesman in Meridian. According to witnesses, Roberts shot both Goodman and Schwerner at point blank range. He also shot Chaney in the head after another accomplice, James Jordan, shot Chaney in the abdomen. Roberts said "Are you that nigger lover? Arledge, 27, and Jimmy Snowden, 31, were both Meridian commercial drivers. Arledge, a high school drop-out, and Snowden, a U. Army veteran, were present during the murders. Posey, and Jimmy L. Townsend were all from Philadelphia. Sharpe, 21, ran a pulp wood supply house. Officials say that James Jordan, 38, killed Chaney. Edgar Hoover was antipathetic to civil rights groups in general; he had long been worried that they were under communist influence. President Lyndon Johnson had to use indirect threats of political reprisal to force Hoover to investigate. During the investigation, searchers including Navy divers and FBI agents discovered the bodies of Henry Hezekiah Dee and Charles Eddie Moore in the area the first was found by a fisherman. They were college students who had disappeared in May ; they were found to have been kidnapped, beaten and killed by whites. Federal searchers also discovered year-old Herbert Oarsby, and five other unidentified Mississippi blacks, whose disappearances in the recent past had not attracted attention outside their local communities. By the end of the first week, all major news networks were covering their disappearances. Johnson met with the parents of Goodman and Schwerner in the Oval Office. Mississippi officials resented the outside attention. X" passed along a tip to federal authorities. Schwerner and Goodman had each been shot once in the heart; Chaney, a black man, had been severely beaten, castrated and shot three times. The identity of "Mr. X" was revealed publicly 40 years after the original events, and revealed to be Maynard King, a Mississippi Highway Patrol officer close to the head of the FBI investigation. In the 21st century, most Lenape reside in Oklahoma , with some communities living also in Wisconsin , Ontario Canada , and in their traditional homelands. Europeans came to the Delaware Valley in the early 17th century, with the first settlements founded by the Dutch, who in built Fort Nassau on the Delaware River opposite the Schuylkill River in what is now Brooklawn, New Jersey. In , Swedish settlers led by renegade Dutch established the colony of New Sweden at Fort Christina present-day Wilmington, Delaware and quickly spread out in the valley. In , New Sweden supported the Susquehannocks in their military defeat of the English colony of Maryland. In , the Dutch built Fort Beversreede on the west bank of the Delaware, south of the Schuylkill near the present-day Eastwick neighborhood, to reassert their dominion over the area. In , a Dutch military campaign led by New Netherland Director-General Peter Stuyvesant took control of the Swedish colony, ending its claim to independence. The Swedish and Finnish settlers continued to have their own militia, religion, and court, and to enjoy substantial autonomy under the Dutch. In , in partial repayment of a debt, Charles II of England granted Penn a charter for what would become the Pennsylvania colony. Despite the royal charter, Penn bought the land from the local Lenape to be on good terms with the Native Americans and ensure peace for his colony. As a Quaker , Penn had experienced religious persecution and wanted his colony to be a place where anyone could worship freely. Hoping that Philadelphia would become more like an English rural town instead of a city, Penn laid out roads on a grid plan to keep houses and businesses spread far apart, with areas for gardens and orchards. Though poor at first, the city became an important trading center with tolerable living conditions by the s. By the s, Philadelphia had surpassed Boston to become the largest city and busiest port in British America , and second in the British Empire after London. Several battles were fought in and near Philadelphia as well. Philadelphia served as the temporary capital of the United States while the new capital was under construction in the District of Columbia from to The free black community also established many schools for its children, with the help of Quakers. New York City surpassed Philadelphia in population by Large-scale construction projects for new roads, canals , and railroads made Philadelphia the first major industrial city in the United States. Throughout the 19th century , Philadelphia hosted a variety of industries and businesses, the largest being textiles. Immigrants, mostly from Ireland and Germany , settled in Philadelphia and the surrounding districts. These immigrants were largely responsible for the first general strike in North America in , in which workers in the city won the ten-hour workday. The city was a destination for thousands of Irish immigrants fleeing the Great Famine in the s; housing for them was developed south of South Street and later occupied by succeeding immigrants. They established a network of Catholic churches and schools and dominated the Catholic clergy for decades. Anti-Irish, anti-Catholic nativist riots erupted in Philadelphia in The rise in population of the surrounding districts helped lead to the Act of Consolidation of , which extended the city limits from the 2 square miles 5. The African-American population of Philadelphia increased from 31, to , between and
