If I got the sense that she was having any troubles at school because of her vitiligo I would address it with her teacher. Thankfully, her best friend was with her at the time and spoke up in her place. My daughter told the teacher and the teacher talked to the girl who had been teasing. My daughter shared with me what had happened and I then emailed the teacher. My first response was anger. But after I calmed down I had to think on how I would like to educate Elijah in what to say to the people who ask, educate his teachers and peers. All I want to do is to protect him. Thinking about home school if it continues to get worse the bullying and the spread of vitiligo. These moms shared their letters so you can see real-world examples. Letter from a Mom to a Teacher Hi Ms. I just wanted to give you some information on Leah that I thought would be appropriate to know and understand prior to school starting. She has an autoimmune disease called Vitiligo. Depending on what she is wearing she has white patches noticeable on her knees, small ones on elbows and fingers. Also some that are started to regain color on her neck. Saying she has Vitiligo probably wont make any sense to an 8 year old. She has yet to have to deal with kids being mean to her because of this. Some equipment, such as respirators and feeding apparatus actually prevent some patients from dying, particularly those in a coma who can be kept alive on. This situation has brought about a growing reaction from many people who feel that everyone has a right to die with dignity. The case of Karen Quinlan is a case in point. Her story made headlines in *Machines kept her alive although she was in an irreversible coma. Because there was no chance Karen would ever recover, her parents asked the New Jersey courts to allow the respirator to be removed. The court agreed, the respirator was removed and it was expected that Karen would soon die. But after the respirator was removed Karen did not die. Even without the respirator she lived for six more years, kept alive by a feeding apparatus and hydration. This necessity for a Living Will was further highlighted by a similar case which resulted in the U. Supreme Court decision in Cruzan v. Director Missouri Department of Health. In , Nancy Cruzan was in an automobile accident and suffered irreversible brain damage. While her body lived the thinking parts of her brain were permanently destroyed. Absence of an advance medical directive the hospital refused to do so without court approval. The Missouri Supreme Court then reversed the lower court on the basis that Nancy had left no written evidence of her desires. Supreme Court voted to uphold the lower court after hearing testimony from three additional witnesses that proved "clear and. It was affirmed that a competent patient may refuse medical treatment, and an incompetent patient, if there is "clear and convincing" evidence of his or her wishes while competent, can withhold or withdraw any life-saving medical aid. That Act states that any health-care facility receiving medicare or medicaid funds is obliged to advise patients of their right to. It is divided into separate mini-chapters, each devoted to one specific activity. The mini-chapter is broken into three parts: The Plan describes the activity itself and The Payoff provides an explanation of how the activity can have immediate and lasting impact. Finally, there are several blank lines provided at the end of each mini-chapter for the reader to jot down a few of their own thoughts and experiences related to the activity. This may actually mean taking a week off from the smartphone, since there are some people who spend most of their time playing on their phone and not watching TV. However, this activity will likely not be much of a surprise. But there are a few surprises wrapped up in this book. There are also a couple mini-chapters that require diet restrictions such as dairy, caffeine, and gluten. Existentialists will likely appreciate the final challenge of sitting and contemplating that death is inevitable. This is a plight that will likely make some readers cringe and want to revolt. There are pages that are not focused on the activities but provide insights in one-liners: There are also carefully chosen images to add a bit of cheer and fun throughout the text. For those that may be put off by such additions, please note that the details are not childish or distracting. The various activities are simple and, often, not time-consuming. While some of the activities span the length of a few days i. The most strenuous aspect may be the self-control, discipline, and willpower required for completion. I personally appreciated the addition of the lines for personal note-taking and journal writing. I am a fan of journaling and felt that the additional sections for writing were an unobtrusive nudge toward a new habit for those unfamiliar with the journaling process. This book could easily be paired with other texts on meditation or personal alignment. While not a substantial teaching text, it provides practical techniques for generating more awareness and alignment.
